I know friends who cook meals for the hungry, provide clothes for children during the winter, furnish an apartment for people transitioning out of homelessness, and participate in efforts to reduce gun violence, a major problem in our city. With a larger church they could do even more.

Lastly, as a homeowner, I know the value of having responsible neighbors who contribute to the look and vibrancy of my neighborhood. I believe this project would do that for the Dupont Circle neighborhood by revitalizing the corner of 17<sup>th</sup> & Church. It would no longer look like a run-down ruin.
