OFF-CAMPUS STUDENT LIFE MEASURES INITIATED DURING THE 2000 CAMPUS PLAN

Pre-2000

- Mandatory orientations begin for all students living off campus
- Spring/Fall bulk trash collection program begins during move-in and move-out periods

2000

- The Alliance for Local Living (ALL), monthly meetings of community stakeholders, government agency representatives, and university leaders begin

2001

- SNAP (Student Neighborhood Assistance Program) begins
- Saturday morning community "Trash Patrol" – a sanction program – implemented in West Georgetown
- Off Campus Student Life staff size doubled with hiring of Coordinator

2002

- Targeted educational programming to address 35th Street neighbors' concerns

Pre-2000, 2000, 2001, 2002 programming continues

2003

- Community propose that SNAP patrol community; University responds
- Senior administrators begin to do regular late night walking patrols
- Bulk trash collection dates extended in Spring and Fall
- Special post Halloween cleanup implemented at community request
- ANC meets on Georgetown's campus
- DMV participates in off campus orientation

2004

- "Quiet" signs posted in neighborhood
- University reduces Senior Week schedule in response to concerns raised by community members at ALL meetings
- Party restrictions imposed off campus
- Spring/Fall Community Cleanups begin
- Ray Danieli, 34 year veteran of Metropolitan Police Department, joins the Office Campus Student Life staff
- OCSL "summit" held, during which programs to date are reviewed and news goals for the program are set
- Jas. Alridge, DC housing representative for US Attorney's office, makes presentation to ALL on landlord/tenant and property safety issues
- ALL/ANC meets on campus (per Bill Skelsey's request)

Pre-2000, 2000, 2001, 2002, 2003, 2004 programming continues

2005

- SNAP begins proactive patrolling in neighborhood; continues to respond to Hotline calls
- Late night patrols by senior administrators involve greater number of administrators
- Shuttle Bus Program begins: buses make regular loops through the neighborhood on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights to alleviate street noise and enhance safety
- MPD-GU Partnership focuses on efforts to increase MPD presence in 206
- Enhanced sanctions for conduct violations that occur off campus
- Bulk trash program significantly expanded to include charity donations and work with Department of Public Works daily for 3 weeks
- Georgetown University and Burleith Spring Cleanup held
- Continue work of DCRA-GU landlord relationships
- University requires that landlords provide proof of Basic Business License in order to list properties on University websites
- Partnership with DCRA to increase inspections of houses in Burleith and W. Georgetown
- Run For Rigby inaugurated to commemorate a GU student who died in house fire off campus. The Run raises funds to purchase smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors for all students living off campus
- Nick Majett (DC Attorney General's office) and Patrick Canavan (DCRA) attend ALL
- CPS Safe Home Checklist added to OCH website

2006

- Mandatory orientation: enhanced sanction for failure to attend
- "No License, No Lease" campaign to increase DCRA inspection of off campus houses
- Run for Rigby donates 275 fire extinguishers to houses in Burleith and W. Georgetown

2007

**76 fewer
911 calls
than 2006***

- SNAP enhanced: proactive patrol now staffed by a security officer, who serve as escort and driver, and a professional staff member, allowing SNAP staff to devote full time to patrol and response, and putting an extra set of trained eyes on the street
- Established MPD Reimbursable Detail with CAG
- Session about off campus life for parents held during New Student Orientation

2008

**40 fewer
911 calls
than 2007**

- Leadership meetings between university and community leadership begin
- Off Campus Resource Center established at 36th and N Streets

2009

**96 fewer
911 calls
than 2008**

- Established Magis Row, selective living-learning community, on 36th Street, in consultation with CAG leadership and ANC during ongoing meetings with community leadership
- Weekly review of weekend activities with DPS, External Relations and Residence Life to evaluate and take action re data from OCSL and MPD
- Weekly “trash patrols” expanded to several times per week
- Neighborhood tours for parents offered at New Student Orientation

2010

- Enhanced SNAP: program is expanded from one car to two cars, one car in West Georgetown and one in Burleigh
- SNAP summer coverage begins
- Community Advisor positions created -- two professional student affairs staff now live in the community (one in West Georgetown, another in Burleigh) for the purpose of facilitating community relations and educating student about responsible, safe off campus living and good citizenship
- Chaplain in Residence program expanded to include off campus; Chaplain moves in to home on 36th Street
- Move-Out food and household item collection program initiated
- Adopt A Block in West Georgetown undertaken by University in partnership with Holy Trinity Church and Saxby's
