Members of the Historic Preservation Review Board:


I am writing this letter in support of Rick & Staci's application before the Historic Preservation Review Board for permit approval. They have discussed their plans with us, documenting their desire for a roof deck, with some minimal support space, and their sensitivity to the historic nature of both the neighborhood and the house itself.

They have chosen to insert the new accessible stairwell within the existing dogleg, thus minimizing the added bulk of the insertion. ~~We understand that their work is all "by-right", and does appreciate that they've limited the addition to what is currently allowed by code.~~ *JK*

While theirs will be the first rooftop deck on the square, we recognize that theirs is certainly not the first within the Capitol Hill Historic District, that their rear façade is not original, that most of the adjacent rear facades are not original, and that neighborhoods evolve.

As a good-neighbor for the last 10 years, we appreciate their understanding and acknowledgement of their home's place in Capitol Hill's history, and are happy to support their modification of it, while preserving the essence of the original structure to the extent that they have.

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

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

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
