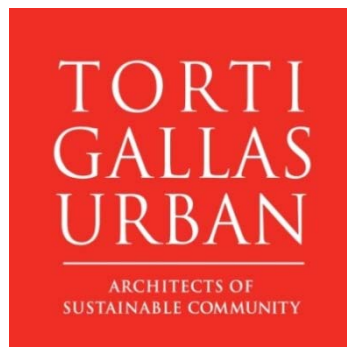

The Stanton Square and Commons Project

- ✂ 53,000 sf Community Service Campus (“The Commons”)
 - o Privately Funded with over \$20 million
 - o Will include programming for Martha’s Table and COH
- ✂ Housing – 120 rental units
 - o The majority of units reserved for people making up to 60% of AMI
 - o Units will be reserved for people making below 50% of AMI, some may be reserved for people making up to 80% of AMI
 - o 12 units will be reserved for people making up to 30% of AMI (Permanent Supportive Housing Units)
- ✂ Housing - 42 For-Sale Townhomes
 - o 37 Market-Rate townhomes
 - o 3 townhomes reserved for people making up to 80% of AMI
 - o 2 townhomes reserved for people making up to 50% of AMI

Martha's Table

Our Work

For over 35 years, Martha's Table has worked to increase access to quality education, healthy food, and opportunity in Washington, DC. Our work focuses on strengthening children, families, and communities and is divided into three areas:

Healthy Start, Healthy Eating, and Healthy Connections.

In the District...

- 27% of DC children live in poverty
- 33% of DC children struggle with hunger
- 39% of children's parents lack secure employment
- 42% of children live in households with a high housing cost burden
- 77% of DC fourth graders are not proficient in reading

Thus...

- We make it possible for individuals and families to access healthy and fresh food that would otherwise be too expensive or out of reach.
- We address parents' need to work and learn, and children's need for additional learning and social supports by providing nationally accredited, high-quality early education, and older youth programming.

Joyful Food Markets

Martha's Table (in partnership with the Capital Area Food Bank) offers free, monthly pop-up healthy grocery markets in Ward 7/8 elementary schools.

- Every student/parent can shop for **free groceries**
- 20+ **volunteers** (majority from the **community**) help set-up and run the market
- Students participate in **cooking activities** and lessons
- Each child is eligible for **23 pounds of food** (40% fresh fruits & vegetables)

Outcomes – Increased:

- **Food security**
- **Consumption** of fruits and vegetables
- Family knowledge/skills of healthy eating
- Reliance on **home-cooked meals**
- **Improved nutrition** and health status of families

Plans for 2018

Healthy Eating 2018



- **Joyful Food Markets** at *all 44 public and public charter elementary schools in Wards 7 & 8*
- ...plus continuation of **Martha's Markets** and **McKenna's Wagon**

Healthy Start 2018



- ~170 infants and toddlers in daily, full-time **early childhood programming** (130 in Ward 8, 40 on 14th St. Corridor)
- ~50 elementary school children in **OST programming** in Ward 8
- Expanded family supports and wraparound services

Healthy Connections 2018



- 30 middle school youth in **OST programming**
- 40 high school students in twice weekly **Older Youth Service Learning**
- 100+ parents engaged through **Success Center**

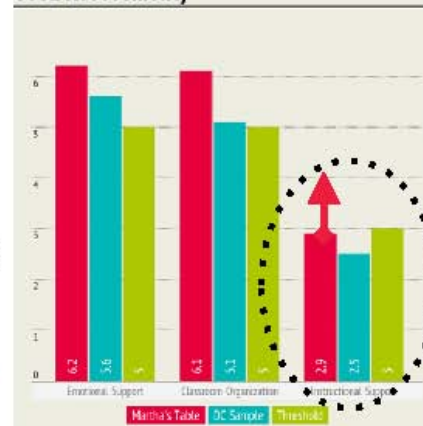
Long-term Impact

In Our Classrooms & Community...

- Increase access to healthy foods, resulting in...*reduced food insecurity and hunger*, and *improved nutrition*
- Extend instructional quality and family supports, resulting in...*increased school readiness among young children*, and *increased percentage of school-age children reading at or above grade level*
- Increase access to academic, interpersonal, and leadership development opportunities among older youth, resulting in...*attainment of post-secondary credential, employment, and a self-defined vision of success*

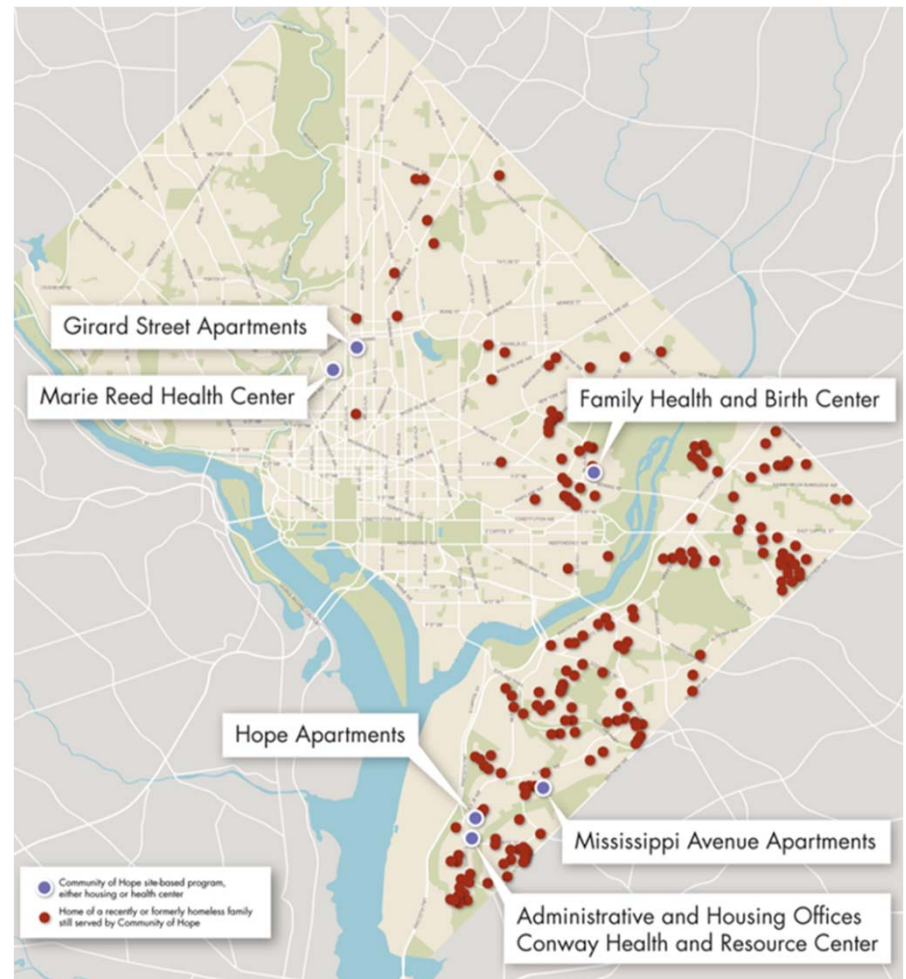


Comparative Analysis of Martha's Table Scores Vs DC Scores on CLASS - Pre-K (As per OSSE Assessment)



Community of Hope

- ☞ 35-year old non-profit, headquartered in Ward 8, providing health care and housing with supportive services to families.
- ☞ Four buildings in Ward 8. Serving hundreds of families in housing and thousands of patients in Wards 7 and 8.
- ☞ 21 Ward 8 residents hired as staff members over last two years; 18 Ward 8 residents hired during construction.
- ☞ 4 of 12 Board members live in Ward 8



Community of Hope

☞ Role at the Commons:

- Behavioral health services for the entire family
- Connection to health services: enrollment in benefits, referrals, perhaps some on-site services
- Supportive services for families, potentially including assistance with employment and job training

☞ Supportive services for families living in Permanent Supportive Housing.
