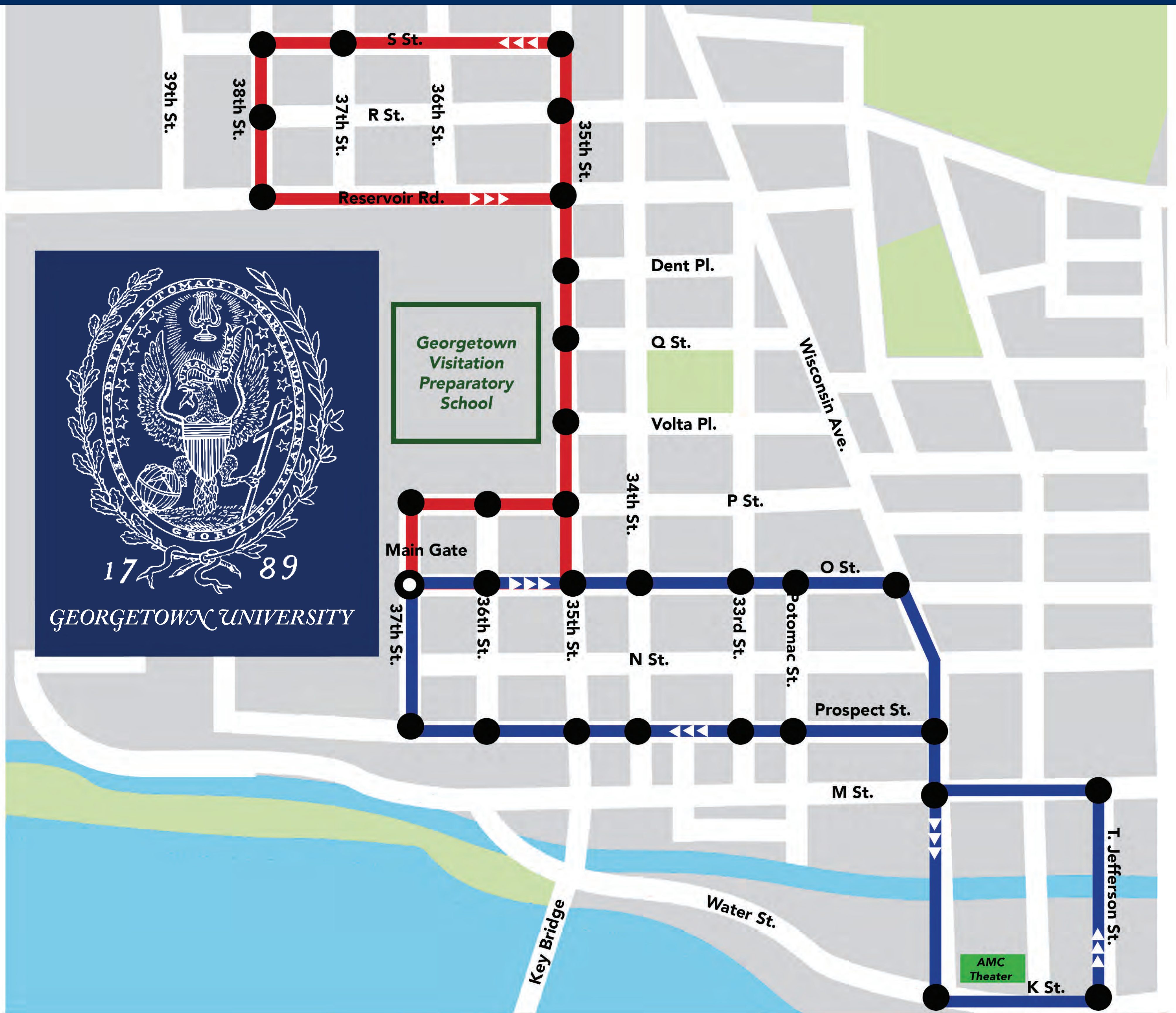


LATE NIGHT SHUTTLES

Trash Reduction Efforts and Initiatives

The GCP Environment and Landlord Initiatives Working Group has engaged intensively in a review of University programs designed to reduce trash, litter, and other negative environmental impacts in order to increase the effectiveness of these programs. These efforts continue to make progress but work remains to fully achieve the necessary results. Specific accomplishments include:

- The Environment and Landlords Working Group has actively reviewed data on trash violations and will continue to monitor and address issues related to trash violations and enforcement, as appropriate.
- Following several months of constructive discussions, representatives from MedStar Georgetown University Hospital (MGUH) and the Burleith Citizens Association (BCA) entered into an agreement to address trash concerns in the Burleith neighborhood. The agreement has yielded meaningful results, as detailed in [MGUH's Fall 2023 report](#).
- The University continues to support trash collection efforts in West Georgetown and Burleith which have significantly reduced litter and trash in the neighborhoods surrounding campus. Nonetheless, the challenge remains to create an environment and to provide necessary resources that focus on behavior change rather than programs that pick up litter but do not reduce poor waste management habits. Other programs involving educational and infrastructure changes continue to be modified to create sustainable waste management habits that should contribute to a healthy and safe environment. These include:
 - The University Office of Neighborhood Life (ONL) provides instructional brochures, orientation sessions, and “on-the-street” and other educational training to students who live off-campus.
 - The University has established several consolidated trash locations for University-owned townhouses, initiated daily University trash collection at these locations, and removed individual trashcans from these townhouses. The centralized trash program has simplified trash management for students living in University-owned townhouses and reduced the impacts of trash cans in public space.
 - The GCP remains concerned about the concentration of trashcans and associated impacts at certain “hot spot” locations off campus. The University is working with the GCP and off-campus property owners to identify potential additional locations for consolidated trash removal for off-campus properties.
 - University staff members walk the streets and alleys in West Georgetown, Burleith, and Foxhall to document violations of DC trash rules and/or the Code of

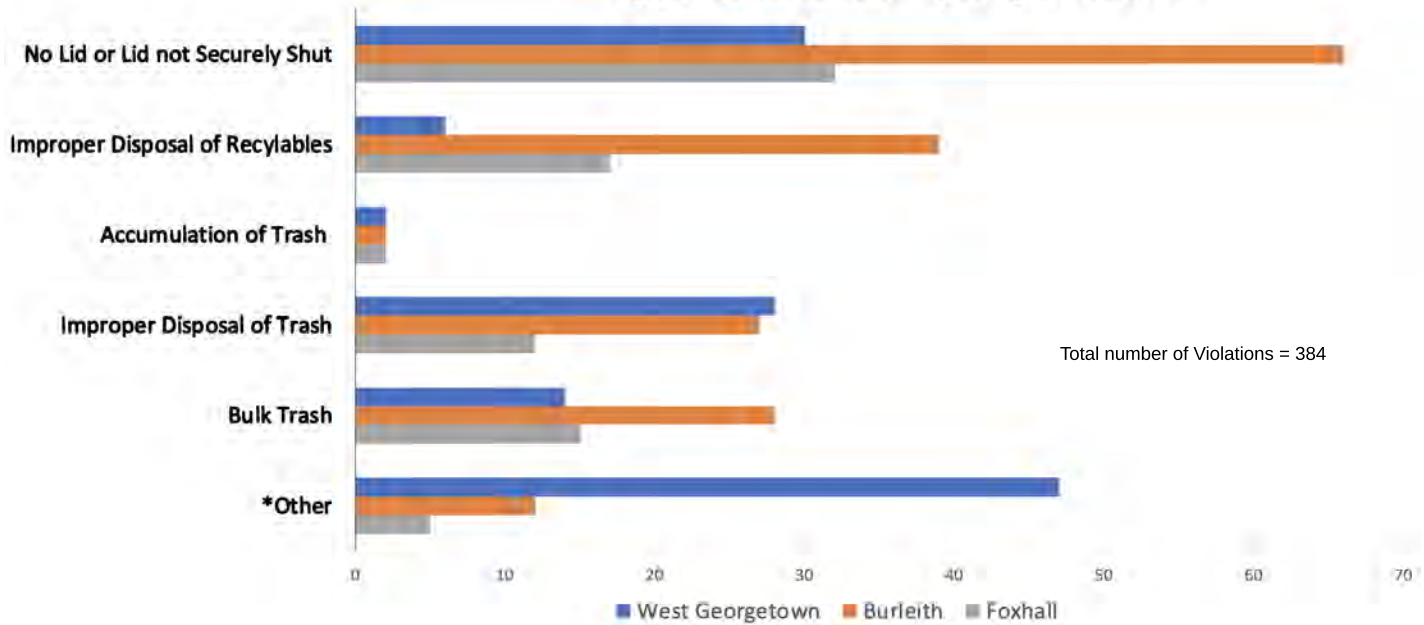
Student Conduct pertaining to trash, recycling, and exterior property conditions, including overflowing trashcans, litter on the ground, and cans visible to the public.

- ONL loans maintenance supplies to students living off-campus to maintain their yards and exterior property, which has helped students better maintain the exterior of their properties.
- ONL designated several “winter houses” in West Georgetown, Burleith, and Foxhall where students can borrow snow shovels and ice melt during snowstorms.
- The University conducts move-in and move-out drives at the beginning and end of the academic year to collect bulk trash items and items for donation from students living off campus and for neighbors. These drives remove bulk trash in an efficient manner and divert usable goods away from landfills. Through the partnership of seventeen nonprofit organizations and twenty student volunteers, the University collected over 48,000 pounds of clothing, furniture, and household goods valued at \$329,000 (including \$136,000 worth of women’s clothing) during the 2024 Move Out Drive.

Since the 2017-2018 academic year, the Environmental and Landlord Initiatives Working Group has maintained a Trash and Property Maintenance Monitoring Dashboard to effectively report and track trash and property maintenance-related violations in the neighborhoods surrounding campus. The dashboard for academic year 2023-24 is provided on the following page.

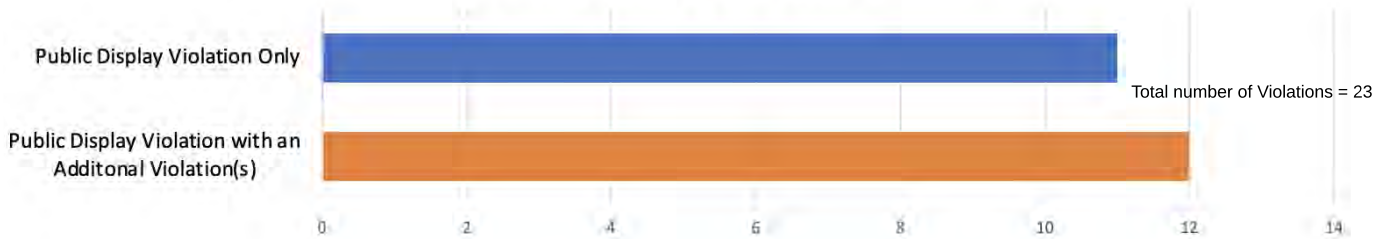
AY '23 - '24 Trash and Property Maintenance Monitoring Program August 21 - May 11

Metropolitan Police Department (MPD) Reimbursable Detail

The University continues to provide support for additional MPD presence in the neighborhoods surrounding campus, specifically:

- During the academic year, the University requests three (3) MPD Reimbursable Detail officers on Friday – Saturday from 11:30pm – 4:30am and two (2) officers on Sunday – Thursday from 11:30pm – 3:30am.
- During the summer months, the University requests two (2) MPD Reimbursable Detail officers on Friday – Saturday from 11:30pm – 4:30am and one (1) officer on Sunday – Thursday from 11:30pm – 3:30am.

On- and Off-Campus Party Policies and Student Conduct Adjudication Process

The University has continued to actively implement policies and practices to make on-campus social life more welcoming and to reduce the impacts of off-campus parties. Examples of these efforts include:

- The University continued its open container policy in certain outdoor areas of campus, including the Alumni Square courtyard, LXR courtyard, Village A courtyard, and Henle Village courtyard. The open-container program allows small groups of students to socialize in University residential outdoor spaces with open containers. Most of these spaces include grills and/or outside furniture for student use as well. The program continues to be successful and without incident.
- The Georgetown University Police Department (GUPD) and Office of Residential Living staff managed on-campus student parties to keep them under control; staff generally did not break up on-campus parties unless they became too large, disruptive, or unsafe.
- In order to better incorporate student perspectives into the development of policies designed to improve on-campus socializing, a student representative serves as a third co-chair of the GCP Safety and Student Life Working Group.

With respect to off-campus activities, the Code of Student Conduct states: “Excessive noise inside or outside a building is unacceptable. If noise can be heard beyond the property line, it is probably too noisy, taking into account the time and the nature of the activity generating the sound.”

- The Office of Neighborhood Life communicates this language during off-campus orientations and the language is in the Hoya Living Guide. This policy continues to be the standard that the Student Neighborhood Assistance Program (SNAP) uses while on proactive patrol. Work remains to ensure students understand that the policy applies to daytime noise as well.
- As detailed in the 2023-2024 Neighborhood Statistics Report (see response to Condition 14), off-campus conduct incidents are referred to the Assistant Director of Student Conduct for adjudication through a process that has successfully increased transparency and completion of cases. The University also offers “Home Beyond the Hilltop” as an educational and sanction-reducing workshop for first offense violations.

Engagement with DC Agencies

Working with the GCP, the University has strengthened its relationships with city agencies to address quality of life and safety issues in the community. Specifically:

- The Office of Neighborhood Life (ONL) and the GCP Environment and Landlord Initiatives Working Group maintain working relationships with the Department of Public Works (DPW) to understand and enforce regulations regarding trash management and to support neighborhood cleanups.
- ONL and the GCP continue to work closely with the DC Department of Buildings (DOB) and Department of Licensing and Consumer Protection (DLCP) to inspect off-campus rental properties to ensure they are safe and properly licensed and to respond to tenant complaints.
- ONL continues to maintain a working relationship with the Office of the Tenant Advocate (OTA) connecting students with an advocate in dealing with landlord-tenant disputes.
- ONL continues to maintain working relationships with the Mayor's Office of Community Relations to assist with quality-of-life concerns facing students and non-students alike.
- ONL has initiated efforts to work with DPW's Parking Enforcement Management Administration (PEMA) to improve communication and coordination with respect to issues and policies regarding street parking enforcement including ticketing, booting, towing, and impoundment.
- The GCP continues to work to ensure consistent engagement from MPD-2D leadership and regular access to police reports.

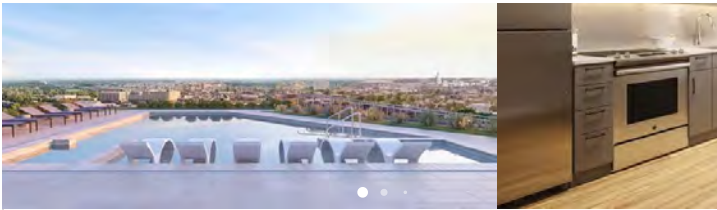

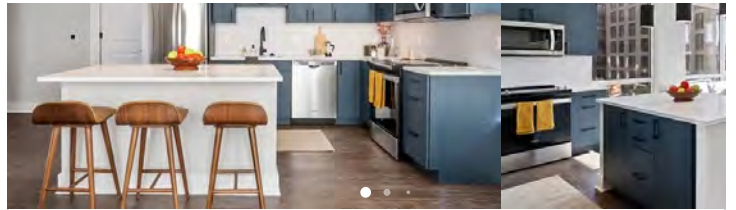

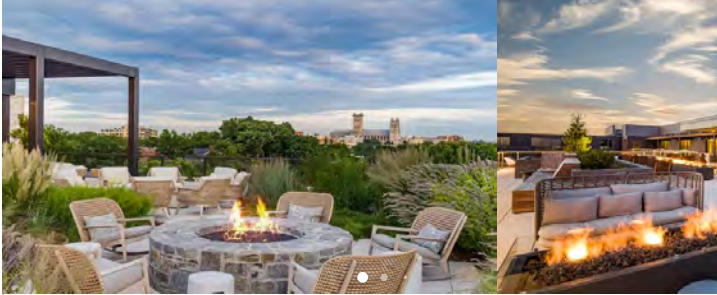

Improvements to Promote On-Campus Student Life

Campus Programs and Policies

Consistent with the Campus Plan's vision for a more vibrant living and learning campus, the University has continued many existing efforts and implemented a number of new programs that have improved student social life on campus, including continuing policies regarding on-campus parties and open containers that permit greater on-campus social opportunities in the residence halls and in outdoor on-campus spaces.

Campus Facility and Student Service Improvements

Following on both the comprehensive housing renewal effort undertaken during the period of time while on-campus operations were impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic as well as major projects in 2022 and 2023, the University continued to focus significant effort and resources on improving the quality of student residential buildings throughout campus. This effort included:

- **Residence Halls Renovations:** Completed full interior renovations of 27 apartment-style units in LXR Hall, specifically aimed at attracting upper class students back on campus.
- **Townhouse Renovations:** Completed full interior and exterior renovations of student living townhouses at 3630 N St., 3615 Prospect St., 3623 Prospect St., and 3609 O St. Features include new kitchens, bathrooms, bedrooms, roofing, siding, insulation, mechanical equipment, and finishes.
- **Redevelopment of the former Henle Village:** In May 2024, vertical construction topped out on the 8-story, 255,000 square foot, 700+ bed residence hall. Along with providing 200+ additional beds on the Hilltop campus, the building will feature a wellness center, study spaces, resident amenities, and an exterior courtyard. Fall 2025 student occupancy is on target.

Additional projects and initiatives focused on supporting student quality of life on campus included:

- **Harbin Terrace:** New synthetic turf, outdoor furnishings, modular seating, lighting, shade structures, and plantings are part of the cosmetic upgrades made on top of the waterproofing and structural repairs to the terrace outside of Harbin Hall.
- **Office of Student Equity & Inclusion (OSEI):** A multimillion-dollar renovation of the basement of New South to provide modern, accessible student gathering, programming, educational, and office space for the Center for Multicultural Equity and Access; Women's Center; Community Scholars Program; LGBTQ Resource Center; and the Disability Cultural Center.
- **Fire Safety Upgrades:** The University continues to make significant upgrades to fire alarm systems, access and egress, and sprinkler systems across campus starting with residential halls. All dorm building, Medical Campus buildings, and Leavey Center fire alarm replacements are expected to be completed by FY 2026.
- **Elevator Modernization:** Four additional elevator upgrade and improvements projects are scheduled for completion in FY 2025.

- **Healy Ground Floor (Healy G):** Renovations are on-going for dedicated spaces for the Georgetown Scholars Program, Mission & Ministry, and Student Wellbeing that will include student spaces, student lounges, and a new hub for student life in a space that had been sitting vacant for nearly a decade.
- **Philodemic Room Renovations:** Accessibility renovations, IT improvements, and cosmetic repairs were made to The Philodemic Room in Healy Hall is a historic space on Georgetown's main campus, and home to weekly debates of the Philodemic Society, one of the oldest student debating societies in the United States and the oldest secular student organization at Georgetown.
- **Reiss Science 7th Floor Lab Renovations:** Mechanical upgrades and cosmetic finishes were improved in the lab space to provide additional student workstations.
- **Site Improvements & Sidewalk Paving:** Throughout all areas of the Hilltop campus, site improvements were made to hardscaping features including additional Big Belly waste dispensers, repaved curb cuts and sidewalks, repaved streets, restriped crosswalks, repointed brick pavers as well as refreshed landscaping throughout campus.
- **Mail Services:** Over 300 new lockers were installed in Leavey Center, providing students with more flexibility, accuracy and efficiency in package pickup.
- **Hilltop Tap Room:** The on-campus restaurant and bar in the Healey Family Student Center re-opened in Fall 2023; management continues to work closely with student groups to ensure its hours, offerings, and programming are attractive to students.
- **Leo J. O'Donovan Dining Hall:** The University Dining Services team has expanded food accessibility, with more options at The Table at Leo's for students who have specific dietary needs and allergy restrictions. New furniture has also been added in Leo's expanding the seating capacity.
