Dear Mr. Williams:

I am a resident of Cleveland Park and I am concerned about the effects of large-scale development in this neighborhood which is largely residential and has been designated an Historic District. I have seen the runaway development on the Wisconsin Ave. corridor, and I am doing what I can to prevent the same situation from occurring along Connecticut Ave.. Traffic, parking hassles, and pollution are three primary concerns that I have which would adversely affect the quality of life in one of the few remaining neighborhoods within the District. I also worry about neighborhood stores such as shoe repair, cleaners, photo equipment, and groceries disappearing as the area becomes more and more attractive to the business sector.

I attended a meeting yesterday of concerned Cleveland Park residents who love living here and really care about preserving an area which is unique and historically significant. I was impressed with their reasonable approach to the zoning challenge, and I add my voice to theirs in encouraging a spirit of compromise in efforts to come to an agreement which will benefit all, not just those interested in profit margins.
