This field has been a wonderful asset for the neighbors, and especially for all of our children. Having a school and church just a few doors down is hard on us as neighbors, but this field is the one place where there is synergy and connection between the residents of Quesada St NW and the church.

The field a safe place where our two sons can play football, soccer or just throw a frisbee with their neighbor-friends. For us parents, we can send them by themselves to the field giving them that little bit of independence they crave. To not allow our kids a safe and local place to play, a place they've played all of their lives, would be so sad and disappointing, especially now with Covid-19 shutting them out of so many places to play and connect with friends.

To change the terms of that access now would frankly be disappointing, especially when we worked so hard 10 years ago to accommodate everyone's concerns. Plus, having more fencing and security would negatively impact the beautiful play area that it is today.

Anything less than that would diminish a community's relationship with the church at a time when connections are critically important, and needed more than ever.
