ANC5E RESOLUTION No. 2017-005 IN RE LIMITED SCOPE HEARING ON REMAND OF ZC CASE NO. 13-14

WHEREAS, the subject of Zoning Commission Case No. 13-14, the McMillan Sand Filtration Site ("McMillan"), lies squarely within the boundaries of Advisory Neighborhood Commission 5E (ANC5E), Single Member District 5E09 (SMD5E09); and

WHEREAS, any future development at McMillan will impact, in some respects positively and in some respects negatively, not only the residents of SMD5E09 but also, in varying and lesser degrees, the residents of many other neighborhoods located within the ANC5E commission area; and

WHEREAS, in response to appeals brought by several community organizations (the appellants), the District of Columbia Court of Appeals, on December 8, 2016, vacated the final order of the Zoning Commission in ZC Case No. 13-14 and the final orders of the Mayor's Agent on Historic Preservation and remanded the case to the Zoning Commission and the Mayor's Agent for further proceedings; and

WHEREAS, in light of the Court's December 8, 2016, ruling, the Zoning Commission has scheduled limited scope hearings, to commence on March 23, 2017, focused on five issues:

- 1) Could the other policies cited in the final order be advanced even if development on the site were limited to medium and moderate density use, and if not, which of the competing policies should be given greater weight, and why?
- 2) Do these or other comprehensive plan policies cited on the case record by the appellants weigh against approval of the Planned Unit Development (PUD)?
- 3) Is the high density development proposed for the site the only feasible way to retain a substantial part of the property as open space and make the site usable for recreational purposes?
- 4) Will the PUD result in environmental problems, destabilization of land values, or displacement of neighboring residents or have the potential to cause any other adverse impacts identified by the appellants and, if so, how should the Zoning Commission judge, balance, and reconcile the relative value of the project amenities and public health benefits offered, the degree of development incentives requested and the potential adverse effects?
- 5) Will the PUD have a favorable impact on the operation of city services and facilities and, if not, is the impact capable of being mitigated, or acceptable given the quality of public benefits in the project?; and

WHEREAS, while ANC5E, and its pre-2012 Redistricting predecessor-in-interest ANC5C, have passed several resolutions of support for the McMillan project over the past several years, including resolutions of support for the Vision McMillan Partners (VMP) revised and modified First Stage and Second State PUDs, ANC5E does retain some unresolved concerns that are germane to the limited scope hearings pending before the Zoning Commission; and

WHEREAS, chief among ANC5E's concerns are estimates that once fully developed, the McMillan site may add as many as 30,000 motor vehicular trips to the already congested main thoroughfares traversing the ANC5E commission area and fears that the amenities package now being offered to ANC5E residents may not go far enough in mitigating the adverse effects of the increased traffic;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that ANC5E hereby requests that the Mayor of the District of Columbia direct the District Department of Transportation (DDOT), in conjunction with the Office of Planning (OP), to conduct a comprehensive traffic study of the likely and potential impacts of the McMillan PUDs on the north-south as well as the east-west corridors adjacent to and flowing out of the McMillan site, including but not limited to North Capitol Street, First Street, NW, and Michigan Avenue, NW and NE, and on the neighborhoods through which traffic from the site is likely to flow; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that ANC5E hereby requests that the DDOT/OP study focus not just on identifying problems, but also on developing proposed solutions to alleviate adverse impacts identified in the study; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that ANC5E hereby requests that in so far as the DDOT/OP study determines that certain adverse impacts of the McMillan development cannot be avoided or sufficiently reduced, that the developers be required to work with ANC5E and its respective neighborhood civic associations to offer increased community benefits specifically directed to benefit the residents of those neighborhoods where adverse traffic impacts are otherwise unmitigatable.

THIS RESOLUTION came before Advisory Neighborhood Commissioner 5E (ANC5E) at a duly
noticed and called public meeting of the Commission held at Friendship-Armstrong Public Charter
School on March 21, 2017. ANC5E consists of ten (10) Commissioners, the presence of six (6)
