I am writing again to reiterate my opposition to the revised plan submitted by Valor. With the exception of paragraph 4, my original objections still apply.

Moreover, it is my view that Valor is trying to fit a square peg into a round hole. The proposed is simply too large and is going to cause serious traffic problems. Drivers will try to circumvent the problem by driving on residential with numerous families and children.

The consultants retained by Valor have been disingenuous at best. For example, the Hawk device is an unmitigated disaster on Nebraska and will only serve to further clog the area around Massachusetts Avenue.

Here is my original letter to you. The revised plan does not adequately address these issues.

I am writing to expression my opposition to the Ladybird Project proposed by Valor. I have been a resident in Windom Place for more than 20 years.

1. The proposal is too large and is going to cause a great deal of traffic congestion in the immediate area of the intersection on Massachusetts Ave. If consider this in conjunction with the congestion around the Best Buy and the congestion that will come with the addition of the GDS Lower School, we will be in a neighborhood choked by overdevelopment.
2. I also feel that it is going to create safety problems on the blocks surrounding the site. A large store is going to require more deliveries and trucks will cut through the blocks trying to get to the store. It was a real problem when we had the relatively small Superfresh. It will be much worse with this proposal.
3. A structure as large as the proposal here is going to have a severe impact on the character of the neighborhood. The lifestyle of apartment dwellers is markedly different from families. I bought this house because I wanted a stable, calm area to raise my family. If we continue to overdevelop areas, families will be forced to move to Maryland or Virginia. A city as great as DC should have room for both. It is unfair for corporations to change the life of families like mine.
4. While I have no problems with Balducci's per se, I feel strongly that the area will be ill-served by another overpriced, boutique grocery store.
