The transcript constitutes the minutes from the Public Hearing held on April

22, 2013.

This is a request by George Washington

University for special exception relief pursuant to 210 and 3104.1 of the Zoning Regulations to modify Zoning Commission Order 02-26A to permit a one-year extension of the order.

Notice of today's hearing was published in the D.C. Register on February 22, 2013 and copies of that announcement are available to my left on the wall near the door.

The hearing will be conducted in accordance with the provisions of 11 DCMR 3117 as follows: preliminary matters; Applicant's case; report of the Office of Planning; report of other government agencies; reports of the Advisory Neighborhood Commission, in this case ANC-2A; organizations and persons in support; organizations and persons in opposition; rebuttal and closing by the Applicant.

3	We've also been joined by Mr.
4	Goldstein of the Office of Planning.
5	Would all individuals wishing to
6	testify please rise to take the oath.
7	Ms. Schellin, would you please
8	administer the oath?
9	MS. SCHELLIN: Yes.
10	(The witnesses were sworn.)
11	CHAIRMAN HOOD: At this time the
12	Commission will consider any preliminary
13	matters. Does the staff have any preliminary
14	matters?
15	COMMISSIONER MAY: Mr. Chairman, I
16	have a preliminary matter.
17	CHAIRMAN HOOD: Okay.
18	Commissioner May.
19	COMMISSIONER MAY: In the past
20	I've made various disclosures and recusals on
21	matters relating to GW because of my
22	children's enrollment at School Without Walls

1 and taking courses at GW and so on.

I'm pleased to say that they are no longer in high school and they are elsewhere in college so I have -- I do not need to make a recusal in this case. It was this case that I think I recused myself on a long time ago.

I am not recusing myself now and there is no other disclosure to make at this time. I wanted to make sure the record is clear.

CHAIRMAN HOOD: Okay. Thank you.

Anyone else? Commissioner Miller.

COMMISSIONER MILLER: On that note, as I disclosed in the previous GW case, I am a proud graduate of GW Law School but I don't think that has any bearing on my ability to make a fair and balanced decision in any case involving GW.

CHAIRMAN HOOD: Okay. Great.

Any other disclosures? Okay. I think both my colleagues --

1 very much.

The other reason I am here is because I do have some background and context of this since I was around in 1998 when this case was first heard so you're stuck with me tonight.

My name is Charles Barber for the record. I'm Deputy General Counsel at George Washington University. With me tonight is Susi Cora, Director of Campus Planning for the University.

This will be very brief. It's a very straightforward case. It has to do with the Lerner Health and Wellness Center that was approved in 1998. There were certain conditions imposed that limited the types of users who could use the facility.

There were two additional classes of users that were added but they were time limited. That limitation recently expired last February and we are here to extend that for one year basically keeping the status quo.

So just a little bit of

background. When this case was first brought before the Commission, this was on the prior campus plan prior to any PUDs, straightforward further processing case.

The concern raised by some members of the community was to limit the users so there would not be any adverse traffic impacts. The original case limited the use to students, faculty, and staff of the Foggy Bottom campus.

After this recreational facility was built, the University came back in 2004 and sought to add a first group of additional users and that first group was students, faculty, and staff of the Mount Vernon campus because there was a shuttle going back and forth and they weren't going to have any traffic impacts.

Also, members of our Board of
Trustee, and members of the School Without
Walls, which you may remember, Mr. May, who

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are permitted to use the facility under the guidance of an instructor. That was the first group.

We then came back in 2007 to ask to continue that first group but I asked for permission to add a second group of additional users and the second group were the immediate neighbors, members of St. Mary's Church, St. Mary's Court, and the Remington. There was a fixed number of users for those facilities.

As well as GW alumni who lived in the Foggy Bottom-West End area. Again, the intention was not to add anymore traffic and that these users weren't going to have any traffic impacts.

These two groups of additional users were permitted but their use expired. The permission for them to use the facility expired February 7, 2013 of this year. We filed this case to continue their use for another year.

Now, there has been no complaints,

no adverse impacts. We actually thought about simply coming forward to make this permanent, but what we thought we would do is take this year extension and do a study and think about how to use our athletic facilities a little more broadly.

basically maintain the status quo for a year permitting those two groups of additional users to continue to use it, and then we will come back prior to next February and come forward with another plan either just to continue the status quo or if we identify some additional users we think ought to have some access or would like to have some access, we would make that case before you then.

I would ask Ms. Cora just to give a few minutes of testimony and then we'll be complete.

MS. CORA: Thank you.

Good evening Chairman Hood and members of the Commission. My name is Susi

Cora. I'm Director of Campus Planning for the GW Division of Operations.

The Lerner Health and Wellness

Center is located on 23rd and G and membership includes current George Washington University faculty, staff, and students. In addition, GW also accommodates up to a maximum 300 additional Lerner Center users.

This group is comprised of approximately 100 GW alumni who live in the immediate neighborhood, four members of the GW Board of Trustees, approximately 25 residents of St. Mary's Court, 15 from St. Mary's Church, and 10 from the Remington.

In addition, the Lerner Center accommodates approximately 375 students per week from the School Without Walls. These additional guests have access to a wide variety of fitness and sport activities and use of the Lerner Center as managed by the GW Athletic Department.

This year GW Athletics undertook a

Everybody would have something because there are not enough of these institutions around the city. I am happy to hear that there are those discussions. It's a great asset to be made available.
