## 1 PROCEEDINGS

- 2 CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Okay. Good evening,
- 3 ladies and gentlemen. This is the Special Public
- 4 Meeting of the Zoning Commission for the District of
- 5 Columbia. My name is Anthony Hood. Joining me are
- 6 Vice Chair Cohen, Commissioner Miller, May, and
- 7 Turnbull. We're also joined by the Office of Zoning
- 8 staff, our director Ms. Bardin, Ms. Schellin, Ms.
- 9 Bushman, and also Ms. Hill. Also the Office of
- 10 Attorney General, Mr. Bergstein, Office of Planning,
- 11 Ms. Steingasser, Mr. Lawson, Ms. Vitale, and Mr.
- 12 Cochran.
- We do not take any public testimony at our
- 14 special public meetings. And with that I will turn
- it over to Ms. Schellin. If you can just recite the
- 16 cases that we're dealing with tonight before us?
- MS. SCHELLIN: Yes, sir. We have Zoning
- 18 Commission Case No. 08-06A, which is the Zoning
- 19 Regulations review, and 08-06B, which is the fee
- 20 schedule for the Zoning Commission and the Board of
- 21 Zoning Adjustment, and 08-06C, which is the mapping
- of the zones, the change.
- CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Okay. Thank you, Ms.
- 24 Schellin. Colleagues, as you remember, when we dealt
- 25 with this in proposed, we mentioned that we had a few

- changes and we have received those texts and tracked
- 2 changes that we requested. And I want to know first
- Before, we have received them, and I want to know if
- 4 anyone has anything in this code that they want to
- 5 revisit.
- 6 Okay. Not hearing -- seeing the general
- 7 consensus of anything not to revisit.
- Well, let me just ask this; would somebody
- 9 like to make a motion?
- MR. MAY: Mr. Chairman, could I ask? I mean,
- 11 I think there is a question that we wanted to resolve
- 12 about effective date.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Okay.
- MR. MAY: Should we resolve that before --
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Okay. We can
- 16 discuss that. And we can discuss anything that's
- outstanding and then maybe we can be inclusive and
- 18 put everything in a particular motion.
- MR. MAY: Right.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Okay. All right. Vice
- 21 Chair Cohen.
- MS. COHEN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I think
- in our earlier discussions and at preliminary final
- we thought a six-month period would be appropriate
- 25 for implementation. But I suggest that we be --

- 1 provide even an actual firm date. And it seems
- 2 reasonable to state right after our break in August -
- 3 we don't meet in August -- but that six months is
- 4 September and I think that the day after Labor Day,
- 5 September 6th, would be an appropriate time to
- 6 implement the zoning rewrite. Anybody else?
- 7 MR. MAY: Mr. Chairman, I would agree with
- 8 Vice Chair. I think it makes sense to fix the date.
- 9 So I would be supportive of that.
- MR. TURNBULL: Mr. Chair, I would be in
- 11 support of that also. It's actually six months
- 12 actually -- anyway. So I see no reason not to.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Okay. So we --
- MR. MILLER: Just to chime in since I made
- 15 the motion on the effective date the last time.
- 16 Yeah, I'm supportive of a firm date and this is
- 17 anticipating that we'll see publication of the final
- 18 order in late February. And so and if it gets
- 19 pushed -- if that publication gets pushed way beyond,
- then we feel the need to change the date at that time
- 21 we can always do that. But I think the day after
- Labor Day is a reasonable firm date to state to the
- 23 public right now.
- CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Okay. I'm just waiting on
- 25 a little bit of information, if we can just hold

- 1 tight for a moment?
- Okay. We also did receive some comments and
- 3 corrections to the map entitled W, and I think we can
- 4 just ask our counsel to make sure we straighten that
- 5 out and clarify that. Any objections?
- 6 MS. COHEN: No, sir.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Okay. Anything else? Any
- 8 comments?
- And let me just ask, we are -- can we
- 10 consolidate the approval with all three cases with
- 11 the date of when it's effective and put it all that
- in one motion, or do we have to separate everything
- 13 out?
- MR. BERGSTEIN: No, you can approve all three
- 15 cases together, with the understanding that there
- were -- you actually have to vote on them all
- 17 together and they would all have the same effective
- 18 date. So, yes.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Okay. Just want to make
- 20 sure we're prepared to go forward with that. Okay.
- 21 So, I know people have probably been waiting for this
- 22 a long time, so give me the pleasure and honor of
- moving, and we approve Zoning Commission Case No. 08-
- 08-06B, and 08-06C with the flexibility -- well,
- 25 any spelling and grammatical errors, any omitted

- 1 words, remove any duplicate text, change section
- 2 headings to clarify internal consistency, and correct
- and add cross-reference. Am I leaving anything out?
- Okay. And also with the effective date of
- 5 September the 6th, which may be possibly be changed,
- 6 nothing set in stone, September 6th of 2016. I would
- 7 move that long-time motion that the City has been
- 8 waiting for for years and ask for a second.
- 9 MS. COHEN: Second.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Okay. It's been moved and
- 11 properly seconded. Any further discussion? Any
- omissions that I made in the motion?
- MS. COHEN: No, sir.
- [Vote taken.]
- 15 CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Ms. Schellin, would you
- 16 record the vote?
- MS. SCHELLIN: Gladly. Staff records the
- 18 vote five to zero to zero to approve final action in
- 19 Case No. 08-06A, 08-06B, and 08-06C with an effective
- 20 date of September 6th, 2016, with the flexibility to
- 21 correct spelling and grammatical errors, add omitted
- words, remove duplicate text, change section headings
- 23 for clarity or internal consistency, and correct or
- 24 add cross-references.

- 1 seconding, Commissioners Miller, May, and Turnbull in
- 2 support.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Okay. With that I think
- 4 this is one of the -- this is the longest case I've
- 5 ever sat on. I will tell you that there are a lot of
- 6 accolades that go out, and a lot of comments. But
- 7 what I'd like to do first is hear from my colleagues
- 8 and I guess I will wrap it up. So who would like to
- 9 -- Vice Chair, would you like to go first?
- MS. COHEN: Well, I have been engaged in this
- 11 process for four years. I think at preliminary final
- 12 there are a number of people I had to thank.
- 13 However, this time I would in particular like to
- 14 thank you, Chairman, for your leadership in working
- 15 through and being very inclusive.
- Just a small thing, on Tuesday, at the State
- of the Union Address where President Obama used the
- 18 opportunity to be very very optimistic about the
- 19 future, the future of the country, I kind of wasn't
- 20 as enthusiastic as he could be. But on a local level
- I do believe what he stated, how people came
- together, how they disagreed, and how they finally
- 23 cooperated and compromised on a document that will
- 24 have tremendous effects on the future of Washington,
- 25 D.C.

- I personally am proud that I have been part
- of it. I believe that it doesn't satisfy everybody.
- 3 Nothing this extensive ever does. But it certainly
- 4 will demonstrate in the future that our city will
- 5 still remain the finest city in the world. Thank
- 6 you.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Thank you. Commissioner
- 8 Miller.
- 9 MR. MILLER: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Yes,
- 10 I've only been involved here at the Zoning Commission
- 11 for -- on the Zoning Regulations rewrite for three
- 12 years and four months. But I did serve on the Zoning
- 13 Regulations Review Task Force that OP convened on
- 14 behalf of the Council Chairman back in -- I don't
- 15 know when that was. 2006, '07, '08, '09. I don't
- 16 know. It was a long time. This has been a long time
- 17 coming. This is a milestone and I would like to echo
- 18 the Vice Chair's commendation of our chairman,
- 19 Anthony Hood who has been steadfast throughout this
- 20 process, and patient, and has particularly pushed all
- 21 along for the maximization of community outreach and
- 22 community input.
- 23 And I think -- and asking the Office of
- 24 Planning every time that he and others asked the
- 25 Office of Planning to go back to the community, they

- 1 did so. And we appreciate the Office of Planning's
- 2 incredible work on this, and our own Office of
- 3 Zoning's work, and the Office of Attorney General.
- 4 It's just enormous -- it's an enormous effort to
- 5 comprehensively rewrite, reform, the Zoning
- 6 Regulations. And I think it was, as we all know, and
- 7 those who have followed it, it has been an evolving
- 8 document. It has changed greatly as the result of
- 9 the community input that we got from throughout the
- 10 time period from all the stakeholders and from our
- own suggestions and from interested parties, ANC,
- 12 Civic Associations.
- So I think it's a better document. We all
- don't agree with everything in it. We've had that,
- 15 at least one week long of meetings where we voted on,
- 16 I think it was over 150 discrete questions that were
- 17 designed by our fabulous OZ and OP staff to
- 18 crystalize what all the issues were. They weren't
- 19 all -- there were many unanimous votes but there were
- 20 many -- there were several divided votes as well.
- But we've moved on from that. And I think we have a
- 22 good consensus document.
- And it is a, as you pointed out, Mr. Chairman
- 24 in the past, it is a living document. It can be
- 25 amended from time to time as the current 1958

- 1 regulations have been amended repeatedly from time to
- 2 time when we needed to make, whether it's
- 3 corrections, clarifications or revisit policies or
- 4 consider new policies. So I'm pleased that we've
- reached this milestone today and I thank everybody
- 6 for their involvement.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Okay. Thank you.
- 8 Commissioner Turnbull.
- 9 MR. TURNBULL: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Having
- 10 been here for the duration of the process serving
- with you and actually going back 10 years when you
- were Vice Chair, with Carol Mitten as Chair, it's
- 13 always been a pleasure working with you. And I think
- 14 you had a clear head. You fought for a lot of things
- 15 that people didn't agree with, and not all of us on
- 16 here. I think we've had enough arguments up here
- 17 too. But they've always been congenial and I think
- we've tried to work together and see each other's
- 19 point of view. And so it's been a -- as I say, it's
- 20 been collegial atmosphere working up here, going
- 21 through all of this with this changing document that
- we've had.
- And we've had a lot of help along the way,
- 24 with that, with the Office of Planning, OAG, and the
- 25 Office of Zoning to help us go through and look at

- 1 this. And with OP's tracking all the changes I think
- 2 it's been a -- that was a laborious chore as it was,
- 3 and OAG's helping to review all of the comments that
- 4 we've made and consolidate them and go -- for us to
- 5 go back and review. So it's been an incredible
- 6 process but I think we have a significantly changed
- 7 document to work with going forward. I think this is
- 8 something that will benefit the whole city and I
- 9 think not only residents but attorneys, everyone, law
- 10 makers, architects. Everybody can now use the
- 11 document and understand -- hopefully understand the
- 12 zoning of the city a little bit better, and come and
- 13 find themselves a little bit more in tuned to what's
- 14 going on.
- So I think it's been a great process and I
- want to thank you for your leadership. And I look
- 17 forward to interpreting this document as we go
- 18 forward.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Okay. Thank you, Mr.
- 20 Turnbull. Commissioner May.
- MR. MAY: Okay. I'll try not to repeat too
- 22 much. So I'm especially pleased to be at this point.
- 23 I have served in the Zoning Commission in two chairs
- 24 and one at that end, one at this end. And I was
- 25 fortunate to come back on the Commission just in time

- 1 for this case, so a little over eight years ago. And
- 2 so all the substance of this case has occurred since
- 3 then. And it's great now, looking back on it. I
- 4 mean, there were some torturous moments there with
- 5 marathon hearings and a lot of difficult discussions.
- 6 But it's been a good process overall and I think
- 7 we've come up with a really superb document thanks to
- 8 the many people who were involved.
- 9 You know, I think I previously expressed
- 10 thanks to the staff of the Office of Zoning, the
- office of Planning, the Office of the Attorney
- 12 General, and the many other people who were involved,
- including the members of the public.
- I do think that what we have now is a code
- 15 that is really designed for the future of Washington.
- 16 I think we tried to look a little bit further into
- 17 the future when we started. And I think we had to
- 18 compromise a little bit. But I do feel that we made
- 19 some very positive steps into the future and how
- 20 Washington will be shaped by this new zoning
- 21 regulation.
- So back to thanks for a second, I do want to
- 23 thank all of my fellow commissioners, including those
- 24 who served and left before it got done but were ably
- replaced and the relative newcomers getting us over

- 1 the finish line. And of course I do want to thank
- 2 the Chairman as well. And I'm tempted to break the
- 3 rules here and make a public display that the
- 4 Chairman would actually object to if it was coming
- 5 from the audience. But I would approve -- applaud
- 6 the chairman.
- 7 [Applause.]
- MR. MAY: I dare you. Go ahead. Anyway,
- 9 thank you very much.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Okay. I have said a lot
- 11 during proposed and I've said a lot through this
- whole process about thanking a lot of people, so
- indulge me for a moment. Some of it may be
- 14 repetitive but I think it's due.
- I want to thank the Office of the Attorney
- 16 General, the Office of Zoning, Office of Planning,
- 17 developers, the ANC and the public, and I really want
- 18 to thank the mayors who have been under this. I
- 19 think when this started Mayor Williams, Mayor Gray,
- 20 and now Mayor Bowser, I want to thank all of them
- 21 because they have been supportive in this process,
- 22 and more than all -- all of them have stayed out of
- 23 this process. And I can say that. I'm not scared to
- 24 say that because they stayed out of it.
- This has been the Zoning Commission process.

- 1 And you know, I know we didn't always agree.
- 2 Community didn't always agree. The five of us didn't
- 3 always agree. But I think that makes a better
- 4 document, when everyone has -- you know, we all come
- from different walks of life and we all come from
- 6 different exposures. And when you put all those
- 7 exposures together and then we come up with a
- 8 document like this, I think the City will be better
- 9 served. I'm looking forward to it standing the test
- 10 of time. And I know that we will see how this works
- 11 as one of my colleagues has already mentioned.
- But most of all, I really want to thank
- 13 everyone who ever had anything to do with this
- 14 document. Especially our former colleagues, which
- 15 was already mentioned. Some of them started, some of
- them -- and they're not around here, but they also
- 17 can rest their hat on this document.
- But really, I really want to thank my four
- 19 colleagues. You all have put up with how I have
- 20 tried to do things. We have worked together, some of
- them. We may have disagreed. But like one of my
- 22 colleagues had mentioned, it was collegial. And
- 23 that's what it's about.
- Now I guess the main thing is now, once our
- 25 effective date -- let's put this document to work.

- 1 Let's see what happens. And let's make this --
- 2 Washington, D.C. a better place for all of us to
- 3 live. So I don't have anything to add and I
- 4 appreciate all the nice comments.
- But again, the folks, our support staff, and
- 6 I don't need to name them again, were very helpful in
- 7 getting this ready. And when I say support staff,
- 8 public who is watching the stream, I mean the public
- 9 also as well as the ANC, and everyone who had
- 10 anything to do with helping us make this document.
- 11 And I don't think I missed anybody. If I did, we
- include you too.
- So, does anybody have anything else? I was
- 14 going to ask the staff but I think we'll leave it at
- 15 that. I was going to turn it over to Office of
- 16 Planning and Office of Zoning, but you know what --
- and then I would have to get Mr. Williams to speak on
- 18 behalf of the community.
- So what I'm going to do, I'm going to leave
- 20 it at that and we can see each other in the street
- 21 and have those comments. Okay. Anything else, Ms.
- 22 Schellin.
- MS. SCHELLIN: No, sir.
- CHAIRPERSON HOOD: Okay. So with that again
- 25 I want to thank everyone. This is seven to eight
